MPRN
The MPRN on your electricity bill is a unique number for the electricity supply at your address. You may be asked for this if you contact customer service.

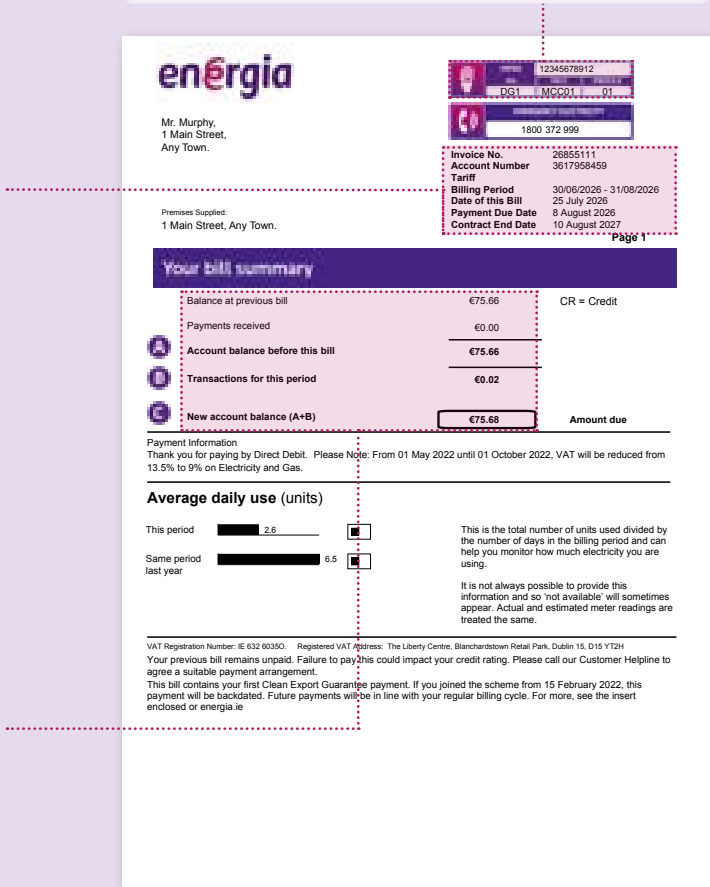

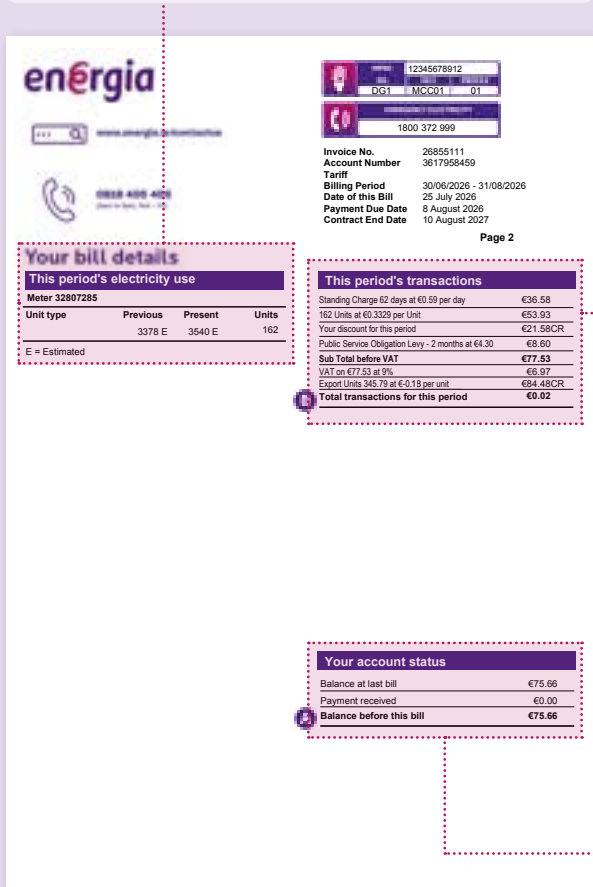

THIS PERIOD'S ELECTRICITY USE

Here you will see your meter readings. If the meter was not read by ESB Networks you will either see the letter E or the letters CU.

A = Actual meter read.



THIS PERIOD'S TRANSACTIONS

This section shows the breakdown of units (kWh) you have used or exported during this billing period.

This is a combination of the fixed charges associated with providing electricity and a share of the supply costs in servicing your account.

The unit rate is the cost for each unit per kWh of energy used.

If the abbreviation CR appears after a value, this means that you have a positive balance on your account.

The PSO (Public Service Obligation) levy is mandated by the Irish Government. It is charged to all electricity customers in Ireland and supports the generation of electricity from sustainable, renewable and indigenous sources.

This is your payment for what you have exported back to the grid. This appears as a credit on your bill and will show the unit rate and units exported here.

YOUR ACCOUNT STATUS

This lists recent payments received and the balance of your account prior to this bill.

Frequently asked questions



What is Microgeneration?

Microgeneration means generating your own renewable electricity at home using technologies like solar panels. If your system produces more electricity than you use, the extra energy can be sent back to the grid. This is called exporting.



What is the Clean Export Guarantee?

The Clean Export Guarantee (CEG) is the scheme that allows customers to earn money for excess renewable electricity exported back to the grid. So if your solar panels generate more electricity than your home needs, you can receive export credits for the extra energy you send back.



What is Energia's Microgeneration export rate?

Energia offers competitive rates for excess renewable electricity exported back to the grid. Visit [energia.ie](https://www.energia.ie) for the latest export rates and tariff information.



Do I need to pay tax on export earnings?

For domestic customers in Ireland, up to €400 earned each year from selling excess electricity is currently exempt from income tax. If your export earnings go above this amount, or if you have questions about commercial installations, please contact Revenue for the latest guidance.



What is the difference between metered and deemed exports?

If you have a compatible smart meter, your export earnings are based on the actual electricity your home sends back to the grid. If export readings aren't available or you're unable to have a smart meter for technical reasons, your export amount may be estimated instead. This is known as deemed export.



How is the deemed export calculated?

Deemed export is based on a standard formula set by the Commission for Regulation of Utilities (CRU).

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Your export earnings

Nice work! You're generating your own renewable electricity. Any extra electricity you don't use at home can be sent back to the wider grid, and you can earn money for it through the Microgeneration Support Scheme.

This guide explains how your export earnings appear on your bill, what terms like "metered" and "deemed" mean, and how your export amount is worked out. Your export credit will appear in line with your normal billing cycle. If you're a dual fuel customer, it will appear on your electricity bill. Customers who pay monthly may see export credits reflected on their bi-monthly bill.

We know some of the wording around Microgeneration can feel technical, so we've broken everything down to help you better understand your renewable earnings and make the most of the power you generate.
